UNC LINKS YOUTH TO 'GIRLS WHO CODE' PROGRAM

Thanks to support from the United Way of Lackawanna & Wayne Counties, UNC was recently able to add a new career development component to its teen programs.

Young women in UNC's Leaders in Training program were provided with support in applying to the University of Scranton's Girls Who Code (GWC) program. GWC is a national initiative that is working to increase the number of female computer science professionals,



and which has partnerships with more than 100 companies that have pledged to hire GWC alumni with a starting earning potential of \$60,000.

Nine UNC youth were accepted into the program and are being provided with ongoing transportation and support from UNC in order to ensure they maximize this opportunity. This support includes weekly review sessions with agency staff.

"I'm most excited to use what we're learning to fix a social problem," said participant Taahairah Muhammed. "One group created an app to address bullying. I want to do something like that."

LETTER FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Well here we are, the Holidays are behind us already and time is quickly slipping away. It's hard to believe we have already started registration for the "Camp Kelly" summer season. It is an exciting time as we plan for renovations of the camp, as well as the expansion of programs to benefit children and families. For the first time in many years, we will be offering a week of Boys Resident Camp. We are also bringing back the Father Son Weekend and a women's retreat weekend as well. We are continuing to explore the possibilities of developing additional programs to offer the community in the spring and fall.

On other fronts, we are cautiously waiting to see how the results of the recent presidential

election will affect our programs. Already we are seeing changes in the housing tax credit market, which provides the bulk of the funds for our recent development work. With the anticipated dramatic reduction in corporate tax rates, investors in this tax credit program are reducing their investments, or pulling out of the market altogether. Additionally, if the Affordable Care Act is repealed, thousands of households in Northeastern Pennsylvania will be negatively affected by either a loss of insurance or an unmanageable increase in premiums. These are just two of our immediate concerns, we are expecting many more in the years ahead.

Despite these concerns, we refuse to be discouraged. UNC has existed since 1923, survived the Great Depression, the Great Recession, and numerous downturns in between. We have survived because we are recognized as an agency that changes lives and strengthens communities. Our ability also depends more and more on supporters such as you. We are grateful for all your past support and look forward to continuing this relationship into the uncertain future.
